You can also see the black and white picture of us three girls crammed into the back seat of an Uber. We did this for the first week but have now become comfortable with one of us sitting in the front seat.


Lastly, we had to get our priorities straight.

On day 2, we found a coffee spot and enjoyed some iced coffees. Java House will be our coffee shop in Kenya, and we visit it often. We are hoping to build relationships with some of the employees.









Moving into our apartment is a story we hope we can laugh about later. We were supposed to move in on a Monday, and then it got pushed back to Tuesday. We got to the apartment on Tuesday morning, and Tori's bedroom floor was partially taken out, there was dust everywhere, and it still had not been painted. They wanted us to wait a few more days to move in, but we told them that wasn't an option. We had lots of furniture scheduled for delivery that day, and we were ready to have a place of our own. We decided we were going to make the most of it. The first picture shows the three of us in our small office room, killing time as we waited for them to finish the work. We played cribbage and had KFC delivered while we waited for the work to get done and the

furniture to be delivered. We got to the apartment at 11:00 that morning and the last worker left the apartment around 9:00 that evening. It was a long day to say the least, but we were so excited to have a place to call home!

The second picture shows us at Carrefour (the Kenyan "Walmart") with three shopping carts. We loaded the carts up as we bought all the things needed for our new home. The last two pictures give you a glimpse of our apartment. We originally thought we needed to wait four weeks for our couch, but we were willing. Thankfully, it was ready early, and it was delivered less than two weeks after we moved in. It is a great feeling getting settled into our apartment. We have been cooking dinner together and enjoying evening movies!









MERCY NAIROBI UPDATE



We are still working on getting our NGO for the church; however, that is not stopping us from being a "church'. We are steadily looking for spaces for Mercy House and setting up routines like staff meetings, prayer times, and space to worship together as a team. All while we are eagerly awaiting for the Kolman family to arrive at the end of the month. We are all very excited for Jordan to join our team here on the ground!

In the meantime, we will be spending this month helping Mercy House get started and preparing to start a bible study next month. Once we can find a building for Mercy House, we will set up our office there as we continue to prep for our big launch around Easter of 2023. As of now, we are working on the logistics of where we can work while also being in the community. While we have our meetings in the Waruhiu's garage, we have decided to find local coffee shops to become regulars in so we can minister to people while working on different tasks. Through working in coffee shops and the bible study, we hope to find people of peace and start individually discipling people soon and searching for our "one" that is close to us but far from God.

Mercy Nairobi will start a bible study on September 7 at the YMCA near the University of Nairobi. The Bible study is 12 weeks long, going through the book of John. We pray that going through this book of the bible will allow people to catch hold of the vision God has laid in our hearts and step up to be core members of Mercy church.

MERCY HOUSE UPDATE

We are still waiting on a few logistical things for Mercy House to get started. Allan is currently working with an attorney to establish the NGO (Non-Governmental Organizations) for Mercy House. He originally thought Mercy House could fall under the umbrella of Mercy Nairobi's NGO. Once Allan and M'Lynn got on the ground in Kenya, they realized it needed to be a separate NGO.

We are also still waiting on a building to use. There have been some potential buildings, but they haven't worked out yet. They were either too expensive or parts of the building have been rented out to other tenants. We have decided that the building we are looking for will be operated as a soup kitchen daily and provide small services like laundry and showering once a week.

One morning, we put together 100 care packages for the women we will be serving. These backpacks include a blanket, toothbrush, toilet paper, soap, socks, and much more. It was such an encouraging time getting items ready for the women and children God has for us.










KENYA ELECTION 2022



Many of you have been praying about the current elections in Kenya. Kenya has been an independent nation since December of 1963, so it is still a young county. Voting took place on Tuesday, August 9th, and the electoral commission has until August 16th to finish counting the ballots. Currently, there are two candidates in the lead. To win the presidency, a candidate has to get 50% plus one of the cast votes and at least 25% of the votes in 24 of the 47 counties.


Many Kenyans went on holiday (stop working) the Monday before the voting happened and are now, five days later, starting to return to work. Kenyans are airing on the side of safety due to voting disputes in the past. In 2007, at least 1,200 were killed, and a few hundred thousands fled their homes after it was reported that the election was rigged. This year's vote has been peaceful so far.

They still have not announced a winner yet, with the race being so close in votes. The votes are expected to be close enough that they hope for a re-vote for the two leading candidates. If that is the case, the voting will happen again before September 8th.

As a team here on the ground, we feel very safe. Allan and M'Lynn have done a great job keeping us informed and taking us places that we need to go.

TORI'S PERSONAL UPDATE

Letting go of independence in this season has been the hardest to overcome.
