



SUPPORT RAISING UPDATE

Caleb and I have combined our support raising efforts because we are getting close to our goal. The chart to the above has been updated to represent our combined support goal during our time at West Nairobi School. The dark figures represent commitments and the light figures represent what is still needed.

Currently, there are <u>26 of the 36 (71%)</u> needed supporters that have made commitments. We are excited to see what God has planned for the other 10 or more. We currently have commitments for \$2,500 monthly. Our final goal is \$3,500 monthly, which means we are still praying for \$1,000 in monthly commitments.

Power outages are common in Kenya and I am so proud of our staff as they navigate us through the unexpected. Our worship leader had everyone still joyfully singing to the Lord!

~Easter weekend was a success! There was a Good Friday service, Easter service, and 3 baptisms on Sunday. Praise God!

~There were 8 deacon candidates that were going through training. One person decided they did not have the capacity to serve the church as a deacon at this time. The other 7 were brought before the members on March 24 and have all been confirmed as appointed as the first deacons of Mercy Nairobi Church. They will serve a two year term.









At the beginning of the month, we had a birthday party for all residents, children, and staff that had birthdays in the months of January and February. Caleb was able to join and everyone loved having him there.

Mercy House has officially moved into a traditional house. Being in town was convenient but not beneficial for teaching the women how to be independent in certain areas.

One area is transportation. When we were in town, they were able to walk everywhere which made timing simple. However, Kenyans usually don't live in town. Most Kenyans live on the outskirts and take transportation to get into town.



This includes waking up early, finding the matatu (bus) stage, standing in a queue (which by itself can sometimes take up to an hour), learning which matatus go where (there is not a bus schedule), how long it will take to get to the next stage (traffic is very congested), and finishing the journey with walking. There are other benefits to the move, transportation is just one example.

However, all of our residents have been through trauma so there are also challenges that come with a transition. In our first week we have seen regressions in the women and children including food insecurity, tantrums, potty training, and disrespect. Please pray for the women and children to build back the trust in us as we try to make the best decisions for them. I also ask that you pray for the staff to have patience and wisdom as we help guide the women and children through this transition.


